

**Annual Report  
Academic Year 2023-24**

The Graduate Medical Education Division serves as the administrative “home” for the five residency and fellowship programs sponsored by the College of Human Medicine. Within the functions of the division, the office monitors continued accreditation of our training programs with the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME). In this role, we ensure that appropriate support is available for our training programs to carry out their educational, research and patient care missions. At the same time, we ensure that our learners work within a safe and academically sound environment.

Among the accomplishments of the GME Office over the past academic year are the following:

1. Successful continued accreditation for all of our training programs.
2. Continued focus on process improvement as reflected in the ACGME Annual Resident and Faculty surveys (aggregate bar diagrams attached).
3. Successful transfer of sponsorship of Vascular Surgery Fellowship from MSU to McLaren Healthcare.
4. Continued partnership with Central Michigan University, Wayne State University and Western Michigan University through the innovative MiDOCs program, placing residents in medically underserved areas across the state.

**Graduate Medical Education Office**

The GME Office continued in its role of monitoring and assisting our programs in meeting ACGME reporting standards for milestones and completion of resident/fellow and faculty annual surveys. Since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, functions of the GME office have been performed remotely since March of 2020.

## **Graduate Medical Education Committee**

The GMEC met quarterly during the past academic year. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, GMEC meetings over the past year have been conducted virtually. During each meeting, roundtable discussions were held with contributions from each program director, along with resident representatives. Included in the discussion were:

- Resident supervision—No global concerns regarding resident or fellow supervision were raised.
- Resident responsibilities—The GMEC monitors resident activities with respect to appropriate responsibility for patient care and peer education and found no areas of concern.
- Resident evaluation—All programs continue to be compliant with ACGME requirements for milestone reporting.
- Duty hour compliance—All duty hour violations as recorded within New Innovations have been cleared by their appropriate programs.
- Resident participation in patient safety and quality of care education—Individual resident patient safety and quality projects are reported by each program director during quarterly GMEC meetings.
- Continued monitoring of effective hand-off systems for all training programs.
- Resident compensation and benefits—The GME Office and GMEC monitor compensation packages in comparison with statewide data and continue to find that the package presented to our residents and fellows is consistent with those in our state and region.

Results of the ACGME Annual Resident and Faculty Surveys were discussed at the June, 2024, meeting (see attached aggregate data). For the Family Medicine and Psychiatry programs, the surveys demonstrated improvement over previous year's data reflective of the programs' institution of corrective action plans during the previous academic year.

Figure 1. ACGME 2023-24 Resident Annual Survey (aggregate sponsor data)

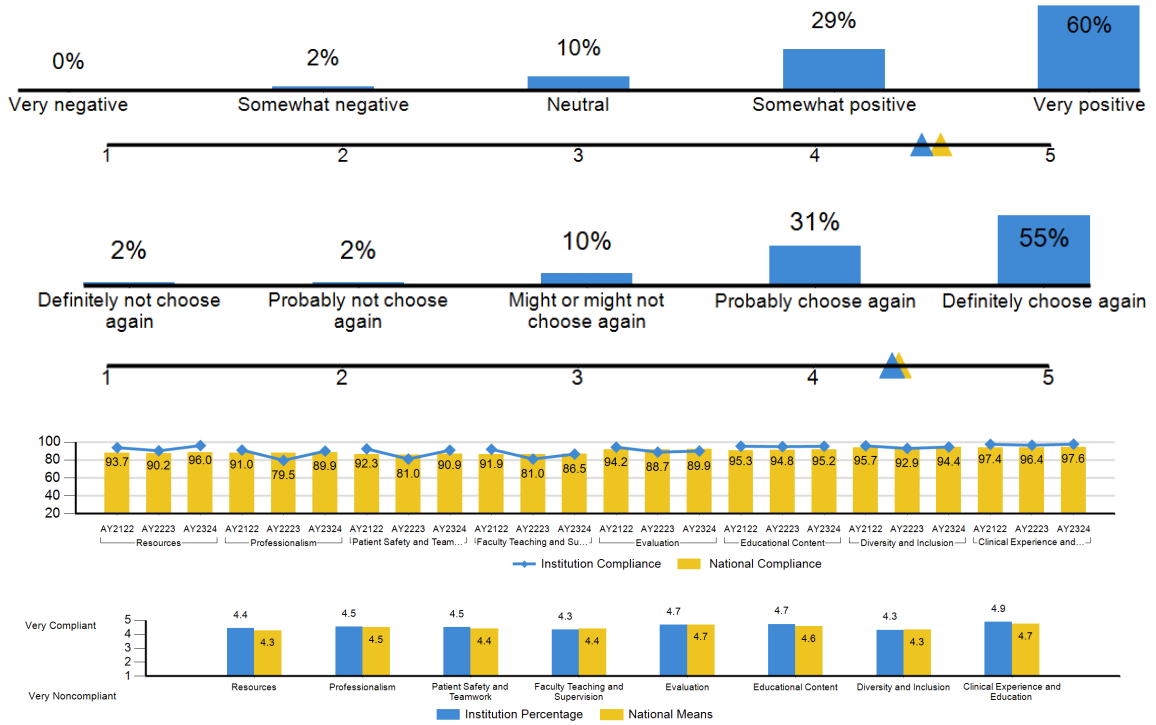
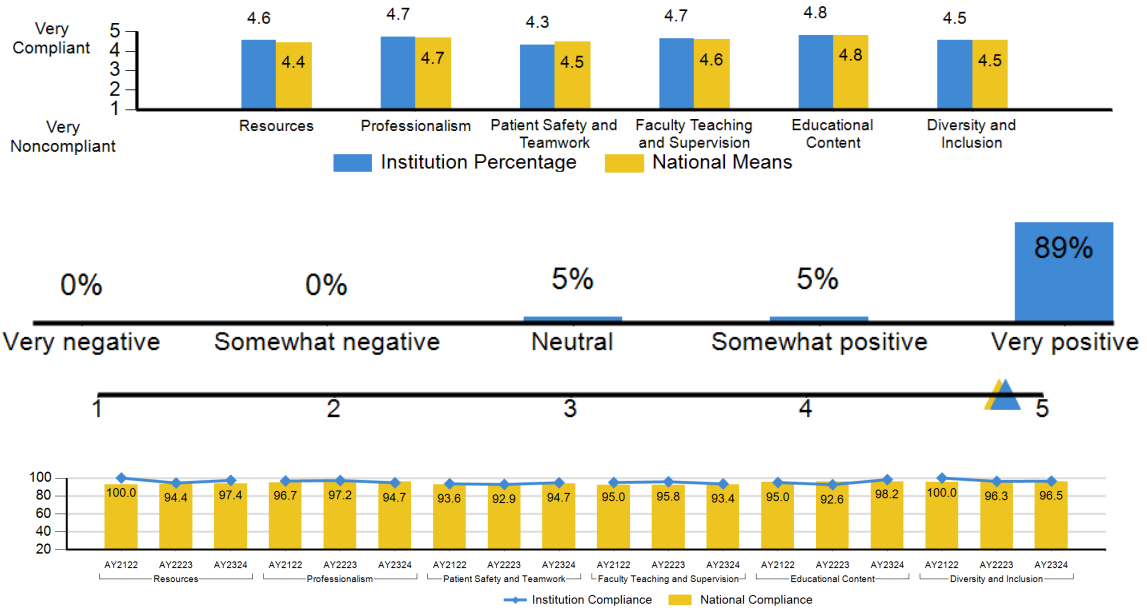


Figure 2. ACGME 2023-24 Faculty Annual Survey (aggregate sponsor data)




**COVID-19 Impact**

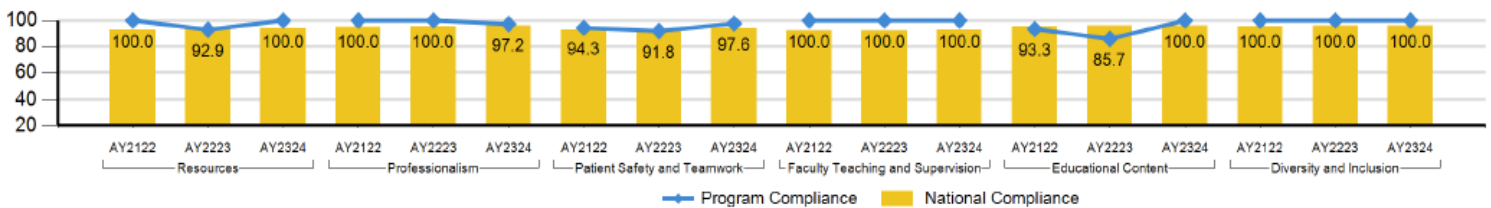

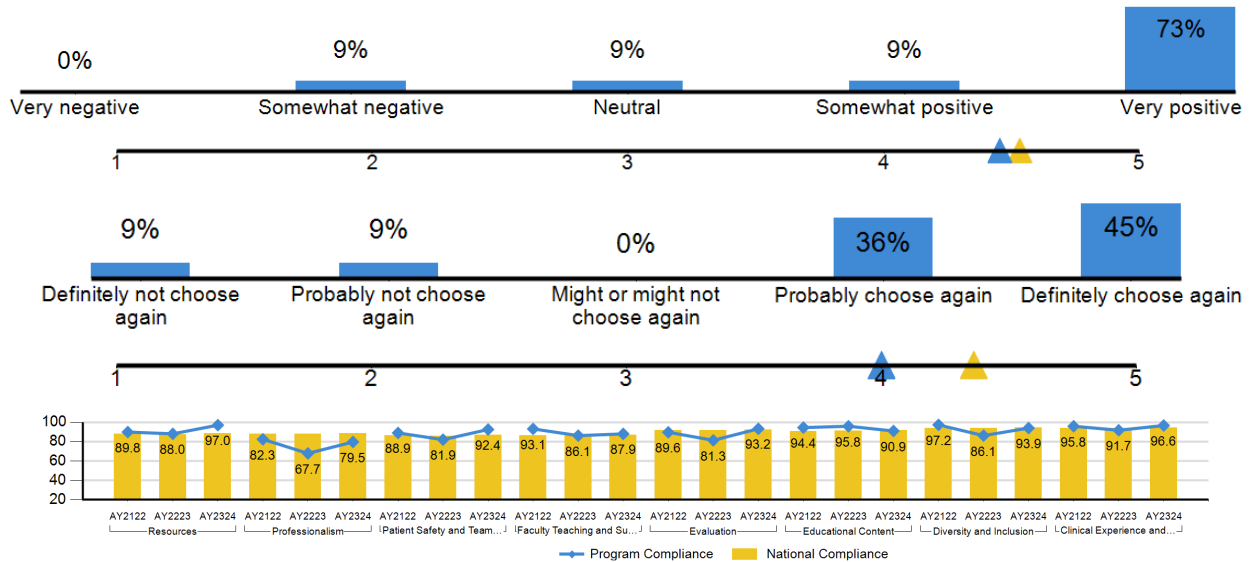
## Introduction

Our program is an unopposed three-year Family Medicine Residency program. We are focused on rural, community-based hospital and clinical practice. Training takes place primarily at MyMichigan Medical Center Alma. Most physician office rotations and all continuity clinics are based in Alma.

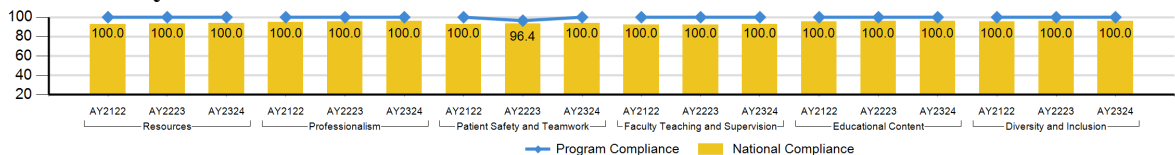
We are a unique program, as our health system is affiliated with the University of Michigan; our residency program is sponsored by Michigan State University, College of Human Medicine. This provides residents with the opportunity to practice in a small community hospital, while also providing access to large academic centers as well.

The ACGME survey results were reviewed at the meeting with residents and faculty. This was also discussed with program’s DIO, and at the GME level. Faculty survey was outstanding, including 100% program compliance in all areas. Resident report showed improvement compared to the previous year. The trend was upward in all but one area. The one area the trend was down slightly was Educational content, however it remained above the national mean. A special PEC meeting was

scheduled and held that included all residents and faculty to review the survey and to develop strategies to improve.

## **Accomplishments**

1. Curriculum was updated to reflect new ACGME requirements. Rotation calendar changed as of July 1, 2023 to reflect new ACGME updates. Total of 7 elective rotation blocks scheduled. Started tracking clinic hours, clinic continuity data, panel data. Patient advisory council formed. PGY1 residents are expected to meet new ACGME requirements.
2. The program graduated (4) Residents this year. All (4) passed their boards with the program maintaining a 100% passing rate. One joined our hospitalist team. (3) will do Family Medicine Outpatient.
3. All our Core Faculty are board certified in Lifestyle Medicine.
4. Program changed Program Behavioral Health Faculty in May 2024.
5. We did all in person interviews.
6. Lifestyle Medicine group visits started in September of 2023. Meetings are led by core faculty certified in American Boards of Lifestyle Medicine and resident on a rotating basis.
7. Ultrasound track started as of July 2023 with 3 residents elected.
8. Patient advisory council met twice during last academic year.

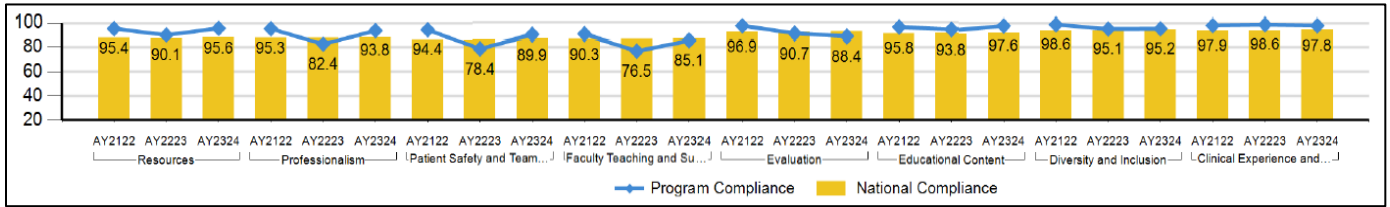
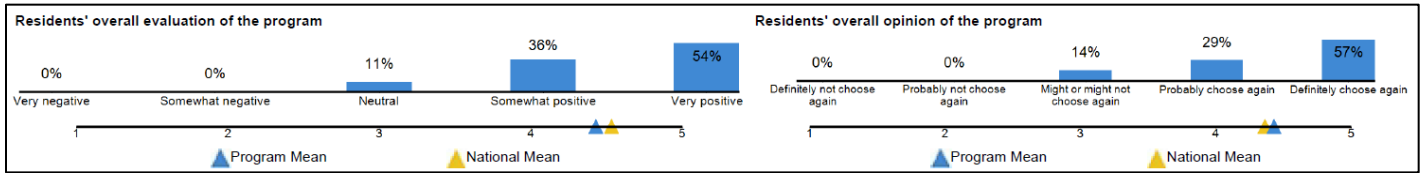

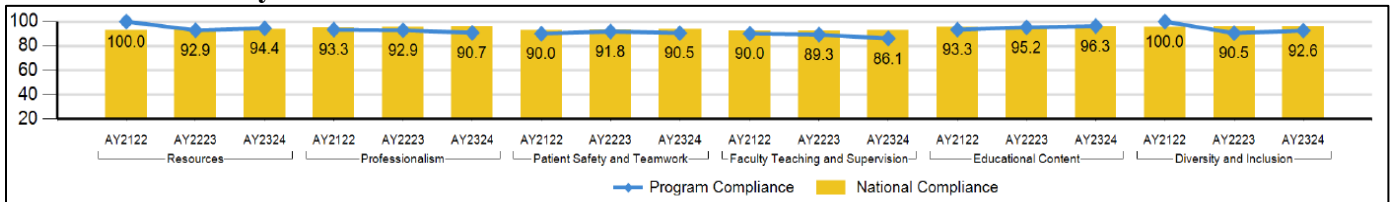
